
Who are students with disabilities?




Transition

Transition Points of Entry and Exit











- OSAP Canada Student Grant (CSG) for Services and Equipment for Persons with Permanent Disabilities (CSG-PDSE) up to \$20,000 per year

- Out-of-Country Bursary for Deaf Students
